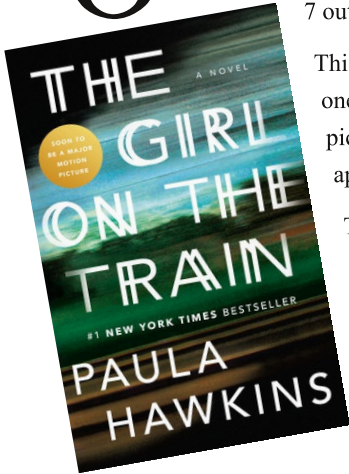


Many Uncomfortable Issues

Our latest book, *The Girl on the Train*, got mixed reviews from “Liked it” to “Hated it” and everything in between. I estimate that it averaged a rating of 7 out of 10; palatable but not exceptional.



This was British author Paula Hawkins first novel and it quickly became number one on the New York Times Best-sellers List. The book was made into a motion picture less than two years after being published in 2015. Not too shabby! I applaud the author.

This psychological thriller tackled a range of real and uncomfortable issues that challenged the reader. Violence against women, spousal abuse, infidelity, alcoholism and mental health were woven into the plot. Along with red herrings (and a red haired man), the reader was kept engaged and guessing to the end.

Indigenous Treatment Provoked Good Discussion

The book chosen for the April Meeting was “Indian Horse” by Richard Wagamese. The protagonist, Saul Indian Horse, is encouraged by his sponsor to tell the story of his life as part of his treatment for alcoholism. He describes his early years, spent in the traditional way until the necessity of attending Residential School shatters his family. The family, devastated by the loss of his older brother tries to protect Saul from the same fate. Never the less, at the age of 8 he arrives at Residential School where every attempt is made to erase the language and culture from the children there. Racism, abuse and horrific punishment are everyday events.

Through the school’s hockey team he finds escape from the horrors of the school. He is a talented player and his remarkable abilities open up new opportunities for him: a sympathetic foster family, better teams, and exposure to the outside world with it’s opportunities and prejudices.

The author’s writing is powerful and compassionate and invites the reader into the story rather than just being an observer. The events and the issues raised about the treatment of Indigenous Peoples provoked good discussion among the group. The members enjoyed reading this book. They found it thought provoking and felt it was a book that all Canadians should read.

2018 RIVER CRUISE

Join us in late September 2018 as we enjoy an 8-day cruise on the Elbe River from Berlin to Prague.

We will be travelling with a company called CroisiEurope. CroisiEurope is a well established company in business for over 40 years. They operate mostly in Europe, but also have ships in Asia and Africa. They have 50 ships in total, ranging in size from barges to ocean going vessels. In 2016 they built a paddlewheeler to cruise on the Elbe River. It was such a success they now have commissioned another ship to be ready in early 2018. Paddlewheelers are ideal for some of the smaller rivers in Europe as they are able to navigate when water levels are low.



The cruise begins in Berlin and we have added a full day there prior to the start of the cruise so that we have enough time to see this exciting city, whose history dates back over 800 years. The ship stops every day for sightseeing in towns and cities along or nearby the river. Highlights include Wittenberg, where Martin Luther sparked the Protestant Reformation, Meissen known for its famous porcelain, Dresden, known for its Baroque architecture and Karlovy Vary (better known as Carlsbad), famous for its thermal springs. There are many other attractions outlined in the brochure.

These ships are small and can hold only 90 passengers, so we have decided to partner with the Probus Club of Mississauga South; in other words we will split the 45 cabins on the ship. There are 17 cabins on the Main Deck and 28 cabins on the Upper Deck. Prices are \$4,925 for the Main Deck and \$5,245 for the Upper Deck. All cabins are exactly the same size. The only difference is that there is a Juliette balcony on the Upper Deck and a larger window. The cabins are fully furnished with a private bathroom and shower, flat screen tv, free wifi and all beds face outward to the windows providing a great view as you cruise along.

The price includes your round-trip flights and the extra day in Berlin (including hotel and meals). All shore excursions are included. Complimentary bicycles are also available. Also included are wine and beer with lunch and dinner and there is an Open Bar on-board (champagne not included). All gratuities are also included. Airport departure taxes are currently \$540.

As this is a new venture for our club, reservations will be on a first-come, first-served basis and we will be restricting this offer for the first few months to our members only. After that we will open it to family and friends.

Irish, Scottish and Japanese Tasted

The April meeting of the D'Stillers was held at the home of Kathy Schmidt and Bill Willcocks. Unfortunately I was unable to attend as I was on vacation. It should be noted that this was the first meeting I have missed since the inception of the D'Stillers. Six of our nine members were in attendance to indulge in a selection of Irish, Scottish and Japanese Whiskies for their tasting pleasure.



The winning whiskey of the evening was '**Jameson Distillers Safe**' with a score of 80%. The Distillers Safe is an instrument that allows the Distiller to sample the contents of the still while the whiskey is in the distilling process. This whiskey is part of Jameson Whiskey Makers series the other two are the Blenders Dog and The Croze.

The second whiskey was '**Paddy Irish Whiskey**' with a score of 79.3%. This whiskey is distilled three times, which is a given for Irish whiskey, it is then matured for seven years. Irish whiskey reviewers refer to this whiskey as one of the softest tasting of all Irish whiskies.

Number three was '**Jameson Signature Reserve**' it scored 76%. Jamesons are considered the trailblazers, ageing whiskey in sherry barrels to obtain a unique flavour. This whiskey was only available for Travel Retail otherwise known as 'Duty Free'.

The original Jameson Distillery in Dublin is now a Museum.

Number four was '**Nikka Pure Malt**' a Japanese interpretation of Whiskey. This whiskey scored 68%. There are twelve Distilleries in Japan. Japan also has the distinction of being home to the world's largest Distillery.



A Distiller's Safe

The last but not least whiskey of the evening was '**Johnnie Walker Double Black Label**' it scored 59%. This whiskey has a smokey peat flavour similar to the Islay type of whiskies. At one time this was only available at Duty Free but is now available at the LCBO stores. There was no age indicated on the label whereas the Johnnie Walker Black Label is a 12 year old whiskey.

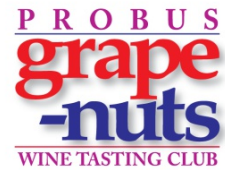

Yet another hair-brained idea

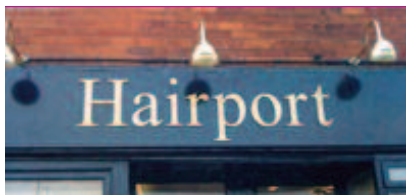
