The First Canadian Helicopter Circumnavigation of the World

C150 Global Odyssey (“C150GO”) was the first Canadian helicopter circumnavigation of the globe — and the first ever father/son helicopter circumnavigation. Departing on July 1, 2017 to celebrate Canada 150 — the 150th anniversary of Canadian confederation — the Canadian circumnavigators flew a Canadian-made Bell 429 helicopter around the world, visiting every Canadian province and territory, as well as landmarks celebrating remarkable achievements and events from Canada’s rich history.



Along the way C150GO was joined by notable Canadians such as Dave Williams, Guy Lafleur, Peter Bregg, HCol Gerald Haddon, and Bronwen Evans. The trip also proudly raised money for Southlake Foundation and True Patriot Love Foundation.

Steven Dengler, our speaker, was one of the three pilots (as was his father Bob). Steve is also a Canadian entrepreneur, investor, and business mentor.

Twelve discerning oenophiles met at the Crawford house for a “Horizontal” wine tasting experience, which does not involve drinking wine while laying flat on the ground, but rather taking wines of similar vintage (year) and grape varietal but different locations to compare for taste and enjoyment.

Participants were asked to opine as to the varietal of the white and red wines chosen as well as the location. With regards to white wines, John Flynn was able to get closest to the mark with Sauvignon Blanc from New Zealand. The red was a Bordeaux that stumped the crowd as to type.

The highest scoring wine of the night was a red: Quartage 2016 by Shotfire of Australia, \$22.95 - score 15.5, LCBO #240911

The best white was: Sauvignon Blanc 2018 by Stoneleigh of New Zealand, \$17.95 - score 15, LCBO #293043

The top red was from the Barossa Valley area near Adelaide Australia and the top white from the Marlborough wine region in New Zealand.

Hosts: Petra Halk and Stephanie Hamnett Theme: South African Favourites

Eleven of us tasted wines from South Africa that were chosen by the staff of the LCBO as the most popular.

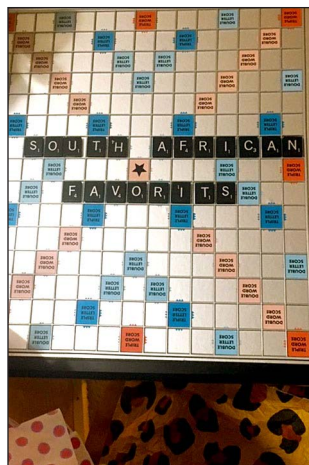
Trying to avoid too much cheese, we did food pairings with each wine that were not cheese, such as asparagus mini-quiches.

Of course there was a game, Scrabble, to determine the theme. Dawn was the first to unscramble the letters and utter the theme “South African Favorites”. How did favorites get spelled wrong? The overall winner was Inception Deep Layered Red by Distell. It scored 14.6, LCBO#292532

The Pavillion Chenin Blanc Viognier by Vinimark Trading was the best white with a score of 14.5, LCBO#292532

The most expensive wine at \$17.95, Cathedral Cellar Cabernet Sauvignon came in second last with a score of 13.4.

The Strachan's wine tasting was on Wednesday Nov. 13th. We had a wonderful evening thanks to our wonderful guests: Pete Shermet, Petra Halk, Michelle Tschirhart, Jim Tschirhart, Gillian Reynolds, Bryan Reynolds, Norma Capper, Martin Capper, and Robyn Balfour. Regrets: Sandy Cannell (ill that day).

Our theme was three different countries, one red and one white from each country. Another thing they had in common was that they were rated 90 or greater by wine 'experts'. The winning wine was rated 96. The only person to match all the wines to their respective country was Robyn (no prize, only bragging rights).

Winning red (score of 15) was Corte Medicea Erastos Rosso 2016 - Italy - \$15.95
Best white (score of 13.5) was Zenato San Benedetto Lugana 2018 - Italy - \$19.95

The other wines in rating order were:

Red 14.3 - Marques de Caceres EXCELLENS Cuvée Especial 2015 - Spain - \$17.00
Red 13.7 - Louis Bernard Louis Cotes du Rhone -Villages - France - \$16.95
White 11.7 - Baron De Lay Rioja - Spain - \$14.95
White 11.6 - Willm Réserve Pinot Blanc 2017 - \$17.95

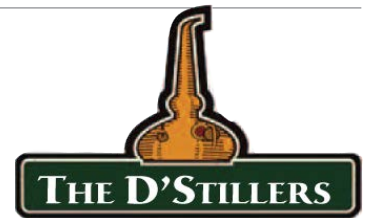

What's a "copper dog"?

The November Meeting of the D'Stillers was held at the home of Kathy Schmidt and Bill Willcocks. Bill selected five whiskies for our tasting pleasure. They were rated as follows:



1. The winner of the evening was 'Speyburn 15yr Old' single malt with a score of 77.1% and an Alcohol by Volume (ABV) of 46% at a cost of \$129. Not available at the LCBO.

In 2018 the Speyburn Distillery decided to get on the bandwagon as other distillers have done and made their 15 yr old whiskey available for travel retail only. The Speyburn Distillery is in Rothes, a town in Morey, Scotland, which is located on the banks of the River Spey. This distillery forms part of Scotland's Malt Whiskey Trail.

2. Second was 'Copper Dog' a blended malt with a score of 71.7%, an ABV of 40%, and a cost of \$42.44. This whiskey is not available at the LCBO.

Copper Dog is a Scotch whisky that is a combination of eight single malts. How did Copper Dog get its name? First thing's first: what's a copper dog? Back in the day, distillery workers needed a way to sneak some whisky. One of the more popular methods was taking a piece of copper tubing and soldering a penny on one end. When no one was around, they'd pop the bung on a cask and dip the "copper dog" into it. Once filled with whisky, the copper dog was sealed with a cork and dropped down the worker's pants. Hey, people will always find a way to have their dram of whisky. Ingenious! Hence Copper Dog.

3. Third of the evening was 'Tyrconnell', an Irish Single Malt with a score of 65.2%, an ABV of 43% and a cost of \$58.00. Not available at the LCBO.

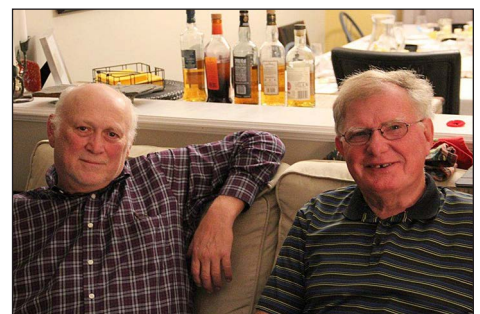
Tyrconnell was an Irish whiskey brand produced at now-defunct Watt Distillery. They named a whiskey after their horse, The Tyrconnell, which subsequently won a race at 100 to 1 odds back in 1876. This whiskey is currently distilled at Cooley Distillery (and soon at the refurbished Kilbeggan Distillery) and is a double distilled single malt whiskey. Most Irish whiskeys on the market are triple distilled and/or blended, but that trend is slowly changing.

4. The fourth whisky was 'Glenfiddich Exper Series #4 Fire & Cane' single malt scotch with a score of 64.1%, an ABV of 43% at a cost of \$80.45.

Think you know peaty whisky? Think again. The fourth in Glenfiddich's much-admired Experimental Series is a marriage of their rarely-seen peated whisky with unpeated bourbon-aged single malt, all of which is finished in Latin rum casks. The series consists of four whiskies that range in price from \$80.45 - \$349.75, a little pricey for the D'Stillers.

5. Last but not least was 'Smokehead Islay Single Malt' scotch whisky with a score of 62.3% and ABV of 43% at a cost of \$75.95. An Islay Single Malt Whisky that's an assault on your senses, Smokehead is for those who smoke tradition and dodge the drab. It's an award-winning whisky that's as bold in taste as it is in attitude. So, if you refuse to conform to the rules of normal whisky drinking, and are seeking out something more uncommon, then here's where that pig-headed inquisitiveness of yours gets rewarded.

Thanks to Kathy for entertaining the DDs, the coffee, and the treats, they went down really well. Thanks to the DDs for a safe journey home. The December 4th meeting of the D'Stillers will be held at the home of Joanne and Ron Millichamp.



Beau's and Bows

The final meeting of Suds and Buds for 2019 was held at the home of Len and Irene Hiebert on November 28th with eleven members in attendance. The house was fully decorated for Christmas with plenty of bows, which was the theme for two of the beers sampled. Len supplied four beers for our tasting pleasure, with one bonus beer for interest sake.



We rated them as follows:

First place went to 'Frank & Sense' by Innis & Gunn (I&G) in Edinburgh, with an average score of 74%. This is a golden ale matured over gold, frankincense and myrrh, with a 5.8% alcohol by volume (ABV). It was the most expensive of those sampled, at \$7.85 a 500 ml bottle. Appearance is a brilliant gold colour with great clarity and light earthy hops aroma with some fruity aspects. This beer has a very light bitterness, light fruitiness, some malt and a touch of exotic spice. With the paper wrap around the glass bottle and the unique name, this would make a nice gift at Christmas. It sells out quick, so don't wait too long.

2nd Place: 'Lug Tread' by Beau's Brewing in Vankleek Hill, ON, with an avg score of 72%, nearly a tie with first place. This is organic lagered ale with a 5.2% ABV.

3rd Place: 'Bah Humbug' by Wychwood Brewery in Oxfordshire, England, with an avg score of 62%. A rich ale spiced with cinnamon, subtle tones of dried fruit, and a 5.0% ABV.

4th Place: 'London Fog' by Beau's Brewing, with an avg score of 49%. A golden ale infused with Earl Grey tea blend, with rich vanilla and lactose, and a 5.3% ABV.

The Bonus Beer was 'Millenium Buzz' by Cool Beer Brewing in Toronto, with an avg score of 66%. An amber lager brewed with hemp, containing none of the psychoactive chemicals of marijuana, with a 5.0% ABV.

In between our samplings, we had crackers and cheese, sausages, chips and hummus and other snacks. The evening finished with Chocolate Cream Cheese Cupcakes and Christmas Pecan Kringle, made by Irene, served with coffee. As always the evening was made complete with shared stories, laughter and fun.

There will be no Suds and Buds in December.

Before We Were Yours

Trilogy Book Club's selection for November was *Before We Were Yours* by Lisa Wingate. Thanks to Shirley and Ray Matthews for hosting our meeting.

Before We Were Yours is the story of two families, one a political dynasty in present day South Carolina, where we encounter Avery Stafford, a lawyer and political aspirant, engaged to another up and comer, Elliot, with a life path that seems destined for greatness.

However, Avery is concerned about her father, a prominent politician who is afflicted with cancer, and her grandmother, Judy, who is in the throes of dementia but at times refers to past events that puzzle Avery and motivates her to start investigating.

The author also describes the story of another family, known as river gypsies, who lived on a shanty boat back in 1940s Tennessee. Queenie and Briny are parents to five children and Queenie is pregnant with twins. During a series of unfortunate events, the children are snatched up by local authorities and placed in the Tennessee Children's Home Society orphanage, an actual historical institution that made huge profits from providing children to prosperous, childless families. Seen through the eyes of Rill Foss, the eldest child, the reader witnesses the abuse and mean-spirited treatment the children undergo.

For our group, finding out that the Tennessee Children's Home Society was a real life facility and that the owners were real people gave extra poignancy to the book. Topics including wealth, privilege and the abuse of society's poor and non-educated were discussed. Our group thought the author was very skillful in going back and forth in time to tell the stories of both families and there were many suspenseful scenes.

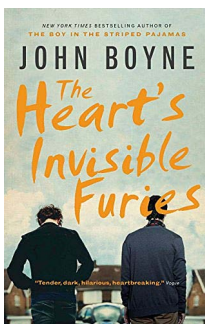
Our rating for this book came in around the 8 to 9 mark and it is a good choice for those who value historical fiction.

Our next book is *The Improbability of Love* by Hannah Rothschild and our meeting will be hosted by Kelly Ground on December 18th.

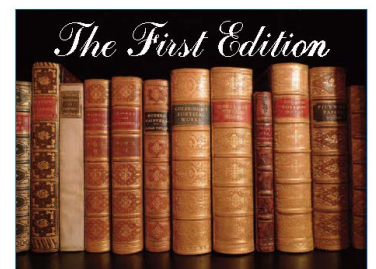


The Heart's Invisible Furies

John Boyne, an Irish writer, set this novel mainly in Ireland with side locations in Amsterdam and New York. Maude spent most of her time in a haze of cigarette smoke writing children's books and scorning popularity when her books sold well. In his early teens Cyril realized he was homosexual, making his life in 50's and 60's Ireland difficult and at times dangerous. The Catholic Church, the police and the judicial system all were intolerant of homosexuality. Cyril spends his life trying to find out who he is and by the book's ending he had reached acceptance and contentment. Although members of our club found some content disturbing all agreed it was very well written and rated it 6.5 to 9 out of 10.

Every piece of music was really worth listening to, proving that in the musical world you don't have to have a "Big Name" to compose Big Music!

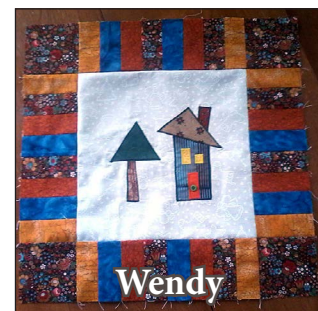
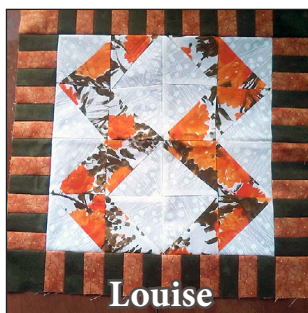

Flying Geese – A common unit of patchwork made by piecing two triangles onto the sides of a larger triangle to create a rectangular piece of patchwork.

Looking forward to all the special times over the holidays!

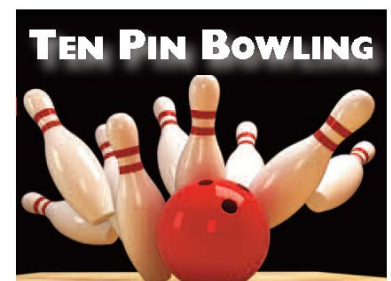


Groovin'
