In the space of a year the couple completed two transatlantic crossings and spent a total of 86 days on the high seas.

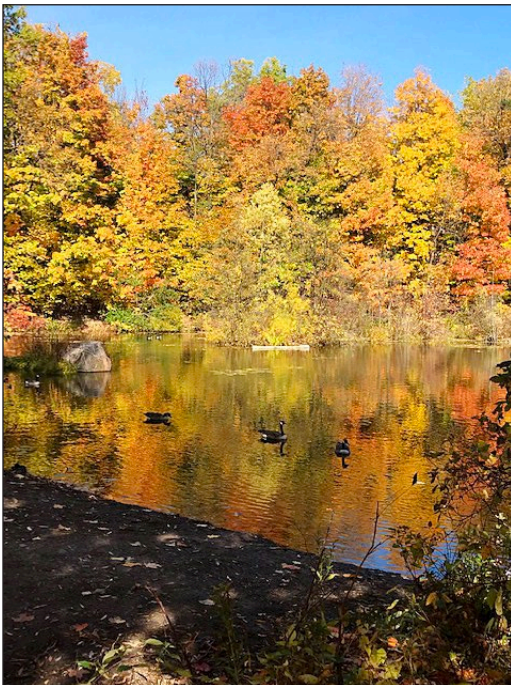
Sue has written a compelling memoir, *Ready to Come About* (Dundurn Press), of their improbable, often perilous, adventure.

October 7th Meeting

The D'Stillers had a change of venue for October - we congregated in the back yard of Frank Dawe, our host for the evening.

Frank decided on an Irish theme and supplied six whiskies for our tasting pleasure. They were rated as follows:

The winning whiskey was Bushmills Irish Honey with a score of 76%, an ABV (Alcohol by Volume) of 35% and a cost of \$37 US. This blended whiskey is more of a liqueur than a true whiskey as it has a real sweet taste that everyone seemed to enjoy. According to the website, this product has been discontinued.

Second of the evening was Bushmills Triple Distilled, a blended whiskey with a score of 74%, ABV of 40% and cost of \$40. This whiskey is matured in bourbon and sherry casks and is later married in port wine barrels. This is not available in Canada.

Third was Bushmills Red Bush, also a blended whiskey, with a score of 71% and ABV of 40%, available in the LCBO for \$35.45. Bushmills claims to be the oldest distillery in the world. They were granted a licence to distill in 1608.

Fourth was a tie between John Power Gold Label and Glendalough Double Barrel.

John Power Gold Label is a blended whiskey with a score of 70% and ABV of 40% at a cost of \$70 per litre. Part of the old John Power Distillery is now home to the National College for Art and Design.

Glendalough Double Barrel is a blended whiskey with an ABV of 42% and cost of \$45 at the LCBO. Glendalough is famous for oak trees used in boat building as far back as the time of the Vikings. The largest Viking ship ever built was the Sea Stallion built at Glendalough.

The last whiskey was The Irishman a single malt with a score of 65%, an ABV of 43% and cost of \$90. Although this whiskey has been giving great reviews, it was not to the palette of the D'Stillers, hence the low score. This whiskey is relatively new as it was launched in 2007 when the revival of Irish whiskey was beginning to take place.

Once again the DDs congregated in the Strachans' backyard where Marg hosted. Thanks for the goodies Marg.

As of this writing, the D'Stillers are still planning to meet for the November 4th meeting in Martin Capper's large garage, where we can still follow social distancing rules. The ladies will be in Anna's garage, doors open, heater on. If November works out well we shall try again in December with the same format. The December meeting will be hosted by Bill Willcocks and Kathy Schmidt.

Mozart at the Movies

We were guided in October by Asoka Yapa on a Zoom journey through movie music. Asoka's title for our exploration was "Obscure Movies with Outstanding Music", or: Movies that sank at the box office but had music worth listening to.



Asoka pointed out that if Mozart, Beethoven, and Schubert had lived today, they probably all would be writing music for films, and would be as well known as today's great film composers such as John Williams, Ennio Morricone, and Hans Zimmer. With the ascent of Hitler in the 1930s, several German Jewish classical composers fled to America and established a great reputation as Hollywood composers. One of the best known was Erich Wolfgang Korngold, who composed for many great Hollywood movies in the 40s, 50s and 60s – such as "Captain Blood".

Here are some of the movies: Nanny McPhee, Miller's Crossing, Man from Snowy River, House of Sand and Fog, Serenity, Gothica, Racing Stripes, Silent Running, Captain Blood.

Our other October Zoom musical meeting was a whole opera (short – about 90 minutes), "The Cunning Little Vixen", by the Czech composer Leos Janacek, written around the early 20th century. Unlike some modern operas, this one was NOT an exercise in musical dreariness or racket. It's a country fantasy, as much about the animals as the humans; a combination of dance, singing, and pantomime, with beautiful melodic music. And as well as hearing the music, we watched all the goings-on, courtesy of Zoom video sharing.

Zoom Paper Piecing

Due to the COVID-19 restrictions, the October Piece Makers meeting was held via the Zoom platform. For show and tell, Carol Ann had completed her Country Roads quilt with matching pillows. Her choice of a soft overall leaf quilting motif sets off the sharp points of the stars beautifully. She also incorporated a flange between the two borders of the quilt. Very nice! Judy is currently working on baby quilts, as she is expecting a new niece/nephew in the near future. This one was made of half-square triangles using up fabrics from her stash. While doing this quilt, she used a method whereby she could make 8 half-square triangle blocks in one go, thus eliminating multiple cuts and bias sewings. Wendy is working on a black and white table topper for her daughter. This pattern required precise cutting and sewing to match up the points – Wendy nailed it! Diane showed us a picture of the progress on her grandson's temperature quilt. She has completed 36 of the 54 required blocks, representing the months of January to August. Now the colours will start going back to orange, yellow, green, and blue. Louise was expecting to get her t-shirt quilt back from the long-armor the following day. Stay tuned next month for the reveal.



As requested, Diane gave a demonstration of the paper/foundation piecing technique to be used to create the Ice Crystal challenge. She used an Add-a-quarter ruler to assist in the trimming and a Stitch in the Ditch foot to sew precisely on the lines. We look forward to seeing the various Block 1 results next month – and perhaps Block 2 from those adventurous quilters.



Quilting Terms of the Month:

Motif – A design element used in quilts that can be repeated or used only once.

Paper Piecing Mantra – Fold, Trim, Sew, Press.

The November meeting will again be via Zoom on Tuesday, Nov. 3rd, at which time, Judy will demonstrate the method she used to make 8 half-square triangle blocks in one go.

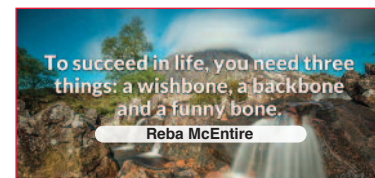
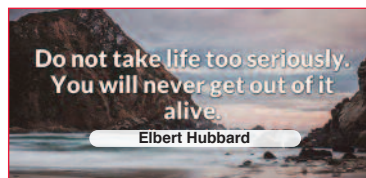
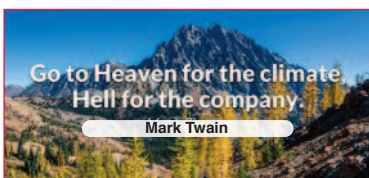
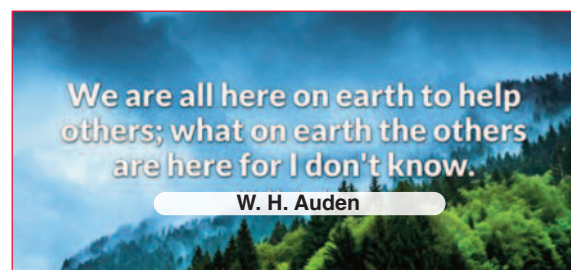
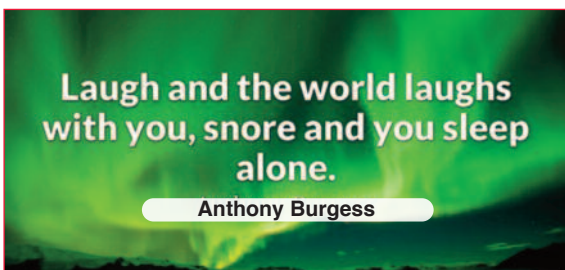
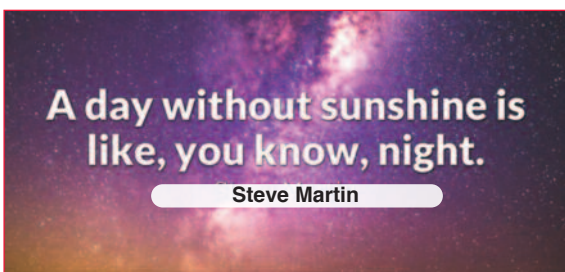
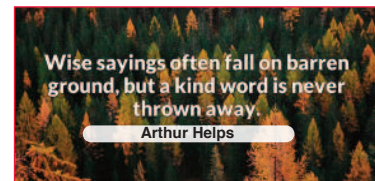
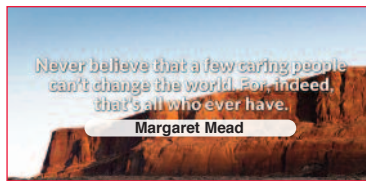
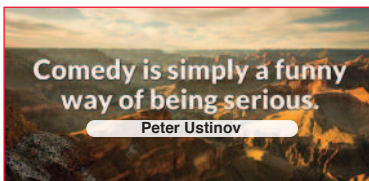
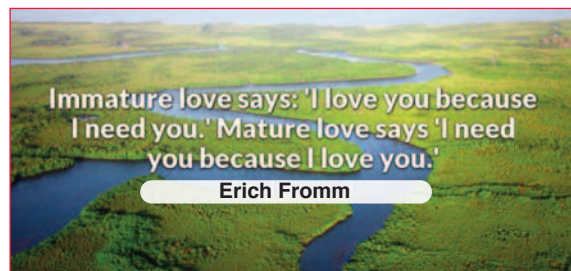
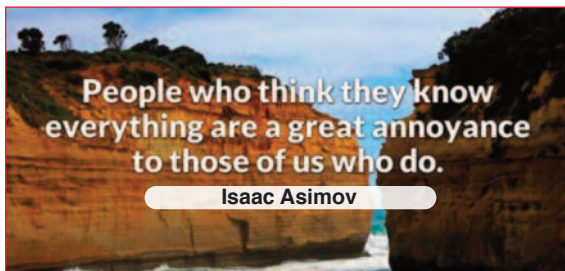
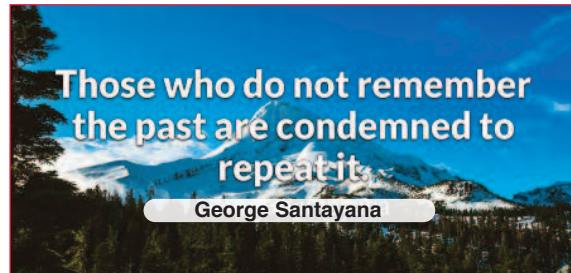
